Then, opening their treasure chests, they offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. 12 And having been warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they left for their own country by another road.

Matthew 2:9-12

Refugee Resettlement Partnership (RRP) December Update

The RRP has been making progress with both families. Today, I made a call to a trusted advisor at Church World Service in Harrisburg to ask for a resource. The trusted advisor said she was hoping I was calling to request another family! I told her we were still fully occupied with our first two families! She then graciously answered my question in the most complete and helpful way possible!

While reorganizing some of my computer files to find previous RRP updates, I came across this note made in February 2022, just 10 days after our first family arrived in Gettysburg. As we look toward the second anniversary of their arrival (2/12/24), I thought I would share my impressions from that day, after coming upon a quote that stoked these thoughts:

2/22/22 Quote from reading the book "Dear Edward"

"The air between us is not empty space.

I want to know what to do.

That's easy. The same thing we all must do. Take stock of who we are, and what we have, and then use it for good."

Impressions:

They wanted to go to Texas. They were not placed in Texas – too many in the family -hard to place large families because no big houses were available.

Nearly at the end of placements for those housed at Fort Dix, the family found a home had been prepared for them. Gettysburg had a nice 4-bedroom house available to rent at a very reasonable price.

On arrival, the warm and welcoming house was shown to the family; with children running up and down the stairs to see all the wonderful rooms and bathrooms. The littlest girl walked around pointing to the upstairs bath, while making the washing hands motion with excitement in her eyes. The father was looking worried, seeing how the family was so excited. Finally, the elder son interpreted: his father was anxious and wondering if this was another temporary placement. He was told that no, this was their home for the foreseeable future. His worry lines disappeared, as a smile replaced them.

Another Day:

Can he walk outside by himself? He's 17, is it okay?

Do you mean is it safe?

Well, no, is it allowed? Can he walk around outside by himself? (the family asked as the 17 year old said he was taking a walk, leaving by way of the back door).

Everyone can walk outside in America.

Donations: things, environment, experience

Who paid for this? (asked about many things)

Larger pans, bowls, platters! (needed!)

Small delicate glass teacups.(desired)

Very warm house (so nice!)

Garbage/recycling crisis. (coach/teacher needed!)

Can opener – using a knife? (coach/teacher needed!)

Bermudian Wrestling match to attend with RRP volunteer – 2 high school boys – see my hands shaking? – I'm so excited.. (so generous!)

December/January RRP Newsletter – it will soon be on its way to you all! We have some interviews and the List of books purchased by the library in honor of the RRP ICPJ Peacemaker of the Year Award, plus a few other shorts.

The RRP is grateful for all the resources and activities provided by our partner churches, our members, and other contributors. I thank you all from the bottom of my heart for the Extraordinary Caring and Sharing you have shown our two families in the last 2 years, as you have all taken stock of who you are, what you have, and then shared it for "Good"!
