Matthew 2:1-12

In the time of King Herod, after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, wise men from the East came to Jerusalem, ²asking, "Where is the child who has been born king of the Jews? For we observed his star at its rising, and have come to pay him homage." ³When King Herod heard this, he was frightened, and all Jerusalem with him; ⁴ and calling together all the chief priests and scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Messiah was to be born. They told him, "In Bethlehem of Judea; for so it has been written by the prophet: 6'And you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah; for from you shall come a ruler who is to shepherd my people Israel." ⁷Then Herod secretly called for the wise men and learned from them the exact time when the star had appeared. 8Then he sent them to Bethlehem, saying, "Go and search diligently for the child; and when you have found him, bring me word so that I may also go and pay him homage." 9When they had heard the king, they set out; and there, ahead of them, went the star that they had seen at its rising, until it stopped over the place where the child was. 10When they saw that the star had stopped, they were overwhelmed with joy. 11On entering the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother; and they knelt down and paid him homage. Then, opening their treasure chests, they offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. 12 And having been warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they left for their own country by another road.

Sermon

"Field of Faith"

Matthew 2:1-12

Through the Christmas Season we have invited Christ into the world. An invitation which sometimes seems halfhearted. The child of light met with a string of no vacancies and was born instead in a lowly stable: far from home. This is the Sunday of Great Light, Epiphany, the story of those who traveled many lands to bow before the newborn king. For to us a child is born, to us a son is given, and he will be called Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace.

For the last couple thousand years, many have speculated over the true identity of these majestic magi. Although we love to sing about Three Kings, the word magi has nothing to do with royalty, but is used to describe a priestly class of Persian or Babylonian experts in things such as astrology, astronomy, and the interpretation of dreams. They came a long way to worship one whose power was prophesized to be greater than all their rulers collectively. By paying homage to the Christ Child, they were denouncing the ruling Roman Empire, spreading light across the globe.

It was the strange star that led the magi, but their visit was filled with many illuminating gifts. Gold to celebrate royalty, frankincense to anoint the Holy One and for his priestly duties, myrrh to prepare the Messiah for burial. The most precious of presents we often overlook, the magi's light of wisdom. God provided direction through dreams, just as Joseph was guided. Last week we heard Dr. Bill Herzog's words on Jesus' dedication in the Temple. Today, I turn to Herzog's wisdom once again as he describes these visitors:

Who were the magi? Traditionally, one of three answers has been offered...

- 1. They were magicians and frauds who practiced the forbidden arts of divination.
- 2. They were a class of courtly priests serving the rulers of Persia.
- 3. They were astrologers who read the heavens and advised rulers on their plan.

If the magi were astrologers, their presence places the so called "star of Bethlehem" in a different light. The star has been thought to be the result of a supernova explosion, a conjunction of planets, or a comet. But it need not be any of these. The star of Bethlehem was not necessarily an extraordinary celestial event, but an ordinary star seen through the extraordinary eyes of the magi. They had "eyes to see." But Herod and his scribes did not.

We know that these mysterious travelers came to Herod's court to stop and ask for directions. The king's wise scribes knew exactly where to tell them to go based on the words of the Ancient Prophet, Micah:

But you, O Bethlehem of Ephrathah, who are one of the little clans of Judah, from you shall come forth for me one who is to rule in Israel, whose origin is from of old, from ancient day. Micah 5:2

But, once they visited this hardened dictator, they knew it was a mistake and did not return. When Herod was frightened, people died. His paranoia led to escalating extreme measures to secure his realm.

Matthew is all about promoting God's grace. The kingdom is wide and for Matthew, grace freely given, even to the "questionable" people of their world. The Christ Child, who attracted wise and wealthy Gentiles from the east to his manger bed, will later welcome the likes of Samaritans, tax collectors, and fishermen. In this light, we see the ministry of Jesus beginning from infancy. Herod's scribes shared the words of a minor prophet proclaiming news about one of the lesser clans of Judea, Bethlehem. Now the magi had the prophetic word and the

bright star to help them reach their destination. When they entered the stable where Jesus was born, they knelt and paid homage to the newborn King, then presented their treasures.

Epiphany is the time of the church year when we learn that God's grace goes far beyond every obstacle within or without. This season is when, through scripture and song, we learn that wisdom is not limited to a select few, but comes from many different kinds of people and places. A great light has dawned, a light that draws all people and calls us to live our lives illuminated by its truth. The prophet, Isaiah, continues to promise, even us, a light breaking forth for all who know what it feels like to "sit in darkness," and we hear the call to arise and become radiant with the light of God.

I leave you with these words from poet, Dominic Windram.

The Three Kings

Although they did not know his name, they sought Him in the bleak darkness of wintry night. It defied all the wisdom they'd been taught, yet they were drawn to a mystical light. With pilgrims' keen eyes that see beyond stars, they followed the light until they found Him.

They offered gold, frankincense and myrrh to the newborn King of Kings without sin;

In a humble stable of hallowed ground.

They wondered how such bright glory dwelt there.

Yet through it all, He slept without a sound.

They realized their riches weren't so rare, not compared to divine innocence's worth.

That blessed night they perceived heaven on earth.

Amen.
