SCRIPTURES Jeremiah 31:31-34

The days are surely coming, says the Lord, when I will make a new covenant with the house of Israel and the house of Judah. 32It will not be like the covenant that I made with their ancestors when I took them by the hand to bring them out of the land of Egypt—a covenant that they broke, though I was their husband, says the Lord. 33But this is the covenant that I will make with the house of Israel after those days, says the Lord: I will put my law within them, and I will write it on their hearts; and I will be their God, and they shall be my people.

34No longer shall they teach one another, or say to each other, "Know the Lord," for they shall all know me, from the least of them to the greatest, says the Lord; for I will forgive their iniquity, and remember their sin no more.

Sermon "Unconditional Grace!"

Jeremiah 31:27-34 John 12:20-36

Will you join me in prayer: God of second chances and new beginnings, open our eyes to see you around us and open our hearts so that we can understand what your presence truly means to us. Amen.

"Jacob!" a voice demanded through the din of the bakery.

"When will the Messiah come?"

Jacob turned from the dough bench and found the man behind the question.

"You know," said Jacob, "there is an old story that, if we were to treat every person we met as if they were the Messiah, then it wouldn't make any difference if they weren't." And, while Jacob spoke, he began to wander in his own thoughts:

"If God makes us by filling us with His holy breath, then God has whispered into each of us. So, each time we exhale, we are releasing God's breath, the message of God's being. That means we are all messengers from the Source, and maybe, if we treated every person we met as if they were a messenger, we would get the message!"

These thoughts calmed Jacob, but the man who asked the question had grown impatient.

"Jacob, do you sincerely think we are capable of treating everyone as if they were the Messiah?"

"I don't know," said Jacob. The questioner seemed to enjoy the idea of this.

"You don't know?"

"My friend," said Jacob, meaning it with his voice, "The furthest a wise person can travel is to the border of their ignorance. The furthest a wise one can see is to the beginning of their blindness."

The man threw up his arms, clearly disgusted with Jacob's answers. "I was told you were a holy man, a prophet, a teacher, but, instead, you tell me that you don't know, that you are ignorant, and that you are blind."

Jacob patiently nodded through the negative description.

"Well," the scoffer continued, "What should I see in you?"

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"A man," said Jacob, speaking slowly, "And, in reflection, you might find I look a great deal like you."

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We all possess the power to express our uniqueness, our compassion, and our ability to get life wrong in many ways. But as a child of God we are also given the glorious gift of unconditional grace. Our lives are often measured by how our faith blossoms and bears fruit, keeping in mind that even the prickly pear has a sweet and juicy center.

The beautiful words from the prophet Jeremiah continue to offer us providential peace and hope because our Still Speaking God can be felt within our individual lives and the whole of creation. The prophet's words of a new covenant are not unique to the ancient community; Noah and the rainbow, Abraham and Sarah and their descendants, the tablets Moses presented to the people at Mt. Sinai. In this passage, Jeremiah presents a new covenant which is written deep inside, etched onto the hearts of those ready and willing to celebrate its meaning.

But celebrating God's unconditional grace did not come easy to the ancient Israelites. When the Babylonians destroyed the temple in Jerusalem and dragged King Zedekiah off in chains, they destroyed the most prevalent symbols of God's covenantal presence, the heart of their worship and the Davidic kingship. God's chosen were not only defeated but devastated. Not only had they lost their God, but their power, prestige, freedom and security.

The prophet Jeremiah had warned the Israelites to change their ways and return to their God, but the sage's wise words fell on deaf ears. Now, God's chosen people had become God's chaotic mess. The people had broken their promises. Again, the prophet appeared and proclaimed that even amid disorder and desolation, their Creator's covenantal fidelity was still intact. The people had broken faith with God, God did not break faith with them. Jeremiah spoke words of hope when all hope seemed lost.

Even though Israel had abandoned their Creator, instead of words of judgement, the prophet delivered a lavish promise, unexpected, good news. God will bring newness out of destruction. God will bring hope where there is no hope. God will bring life out of death. God will make a way where there is no way.

The law will no longer be engraved in stone and displayed for people to see, but not follow. People will no longer know *about* God,

they will *know* God, intimately, from within themselves. God will put the law within them. And so, hopeful Israel waited for their faith to turn inward. In Christ, the early church believed God was at last fulfilling this promise, dwelling within the people and forgiving their iniquity once and for all. However, the reality facing modern day followers forces the church to confess that the new covenant does not hold, either. Faithful people, then and now, live by *hope*. But does our faith require more than hope? What does following the Light and Hope of the world require?

Jesus' message in John's Gospel claims:

"Unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains just a single grain; but if it dies it bears much fruit. Those who love their life lost it, and those who hate their life in this world will keep it for eternal life. Whoever serves me must follow me." John 12:24-26

Christ's words remind us that such action requires letting go of our security. Such justice involves us going beyond our own self-interest in order for us to promote the well-being of others. But in order for this to happen we have to ask, where do we need to die? What do we need to lose in order to be faithful? What do we possess that continues to

tighten its grip, cutting us off from recognizing we are never alone, but are loved unconditionally by the Messiah who can be seen all around us?

Both Jeremiah and John write of the woes and joys of living with God. Within each prophet's words we are reminded that we, too, disappoint and bring joy to our God, who keeps offering each of us grace and compassion no matter our intentions. The wise sage, Jacob the Baker, with hands full of dough and an apron dusted with flour, calmly offers words of hope. We do not have to wait for the second coming of Christ, because our teacher can found in both friend and foe. Everyone we encounter is the breath of God.

My friends, where is the beginning of our blindness? How far must we travel to pass through our ignorance? What within us must fall to the ground and open in new life in order for us to be the patience, hope, peace, love and compassion of Christ to everyone we encounter? Amen.
