SCRIPTURES

1 John 3:1-7

See what love the Father has given us, that we should be called children of God; and that is what we are. The reason the world does not know us is that it did not know him. ²Beloved, we are God's children now; what we will be has not yet been revealed. What we do know is this: when he is revealed, we will be like him, for we will see him as he is. ³And all who have this hope in him purify themselves, just as he is pure.

Now on that same day two of them were going to a village called Emmaus, about seven miles from Jerusalem, ¹⁴ and talking with each other about all these things that had happened. ¹⁵While they were talking and discussing, Jesus himself came near and went with them, ¹⁶but their eyes were kept from recognizing him. ¹⁷And he said to them, "What are you discussing with each other while you walk along?" They stood still, looking sad. ¹⁸Then one of them, whose name was Cleopas, answered him, "Are you the only stranger in Jerusalem who does not know the things that have taken place there in these days?" 19 He asked them, "What things?" They replied, "The things about Jesus of Nazareth, who was a prophet mighty in deed and word before God and all the people, 20 and how our chief priests and leaders handed him over to be condemned to death and crucified him. ²¹But we had hoped that he was the one to redeem Israel. Yes, and besides all this, it is now the third day since these things took place. ²²Moreover, some women of our group astounded us. They were at the tomb early this morning, ²³ and when they did not find his body there, they came back and told us that they had indeed seen a vision of angels who said that he was alive. ²⁴Some of those who were with us went to the tomb and found it just as the women had said; but they did not see him." ²⁵Then he said to them, "Oh, how foolish you are, and how slow of heart to believe all that the prophets have declared! ²⁶Was it not necessary that the Messiah should suffer these things and then enter into his glory?" ²⁷Then beginning with Moses and all the prophets, he interpreted to them the things about himself in all the scriptures. ²⁸As they came near the village to which they were going, he walked ahead as if he were going on. ²⁹But they urged him strongly, saying, "Stay with us, because it is almost evening and the day is now nearly over." So he went in to stay with them. ³⁰When he was at the table with them, he took bread, blessed and broke it, and gave it to them. ³¹Then their eyes were opened, and they recognized him; and he vanished from their sight. ³²They said to each other, "Were not our hearts burning within us while he was talking to us on the road, while he was opening the scriptures to us?" 33That same hour they got up and returned to Jerusalem; and they found the eleven and their companions gathered together. ³⁴They were saying, "The Lord has risen indeed, and he has appeared to Simon!" ³⁵Then they told what had happened on the road, and how he had been made known to them in the breaking of the bread.

Sermon "Recognizing Love!"

1 John 3:1-7 Luke 24:13-35

God has been met and known, even in a human life that was once a helpless infant.

In a human life the limits of finitude have been broken, including the ultimate barrier of death, that is the story we have to tell...

But, what is Christ for **our** day?

What images can we employ that will enable us **to be** the body of Christ with integrity, while remaining women and men of relevance in our generation?

Christ meets us on the road to our Emmaus, in ordinary ways and places and within the spaces we retreat when life is too much to handle. The wandering disciples had not intended to create a sacred place when they pulled up an extra seat at the dinner table for a fellow traveler, but by breaking their bread with a stranger they recognized the risen Lord.

Bishop Spong asks us what images we can employ in order for us to be Christ's hands and feet in our world. Around a table set for dinner, these early disciples symbolize Christ, simply by sharing their meager resources. Hospitality was key in the disciples' gift of recognition. Emmaus can truly be a story of sustenance, feeding and filling one another. Cleopas and company shared their meal and discovered they had been in the presence of the Lord. They did not keep the blessing to themselves. As soon as he disappeared, Christ's companions traveled back to Jerusalem to find their friends.

Cleopas told the other disciples how they had walked and talked for hours with a stranger who revealed himself in the breaking of the bread, how they had encountered their Lord at the table. While they were still working through their astonishment at this tale, Christ appeared to them all in the upper room where they were hiding. This resurrection revelation changed everything for these young Christians, who were no longer afraid, but empowered, who no longer hid in

hopelessness, but had a new purpose, a divine commission. This is our legacy! Through us, Jesus' ministry, love and peace continue.

1 John 3:1-3 is one of my favorite passages, as it claims us as children of God, legacies of this abundant, incredible love. Jesus declared the greatest commandment of all was to love. Keeping that in mind, reading verses 4-7 is all about failing to keep the laws of love.

Everyone who commits sin is guilty of lawlessness; sin is lawlessness. ⁵You know that he was revealed to take away sins, and in him there is no sin. ⁶No one who abides in him sins; no one who sins has either seen him or known him. ⁷Little children, let no one deceive you. Everyone who does what is right is righteous, just as he is righteous.

In these verses sin is not all the vices we imagine would be prohibited, it is a lack of love that becomes equated with lawlessness. If we refuse to love God, if we fail to live with each other in compassion, empathy, justice, and dignity, we are turning away from the very heart of the message.

The wise sage of this epistle had an experienced faith. They wrote to the young Christians who struggled to keep their faith amid the darkening cultural wiles of their Mediterranean world. This letter was sent to take the church community back to the center of their faith. He began by reminding them of what they had experienced and why they believed and behaved as they did, Christ's love and sacrifice.

John's community of Ephesus wasn't much different from those living in Jerusalem's community of first disciples. Just as the disciples continued to seclude themselves for fear of persecution for believing in Jesus, perhaps Christians in Ephesus were mocked and persecuted for following a resurrected Christ. The writer of 1 John places a high regard on Christian experience. However, he also reminds the reader that what matters is not how high one jumps but how straight one walks. Belief and behavior are linked, as we believe, so we behave. Because Christ lived and loved, we live and love in return!

Biblical historian, Joseph Loconte, in his book, *The Searchers: A Quest for Faith in the Valley of Doubt*, says this about the journey between Jerusalem and Emmaus:

The disciples were shocked and in utter disillusionment that their leader, the one they thought would redeem Israel, had been crucified. They had lost all hope, yet something called them out of their state of doubt and to the stranger coming alongside them on the road. They did not recognize him as Jesus – not yet – but their intuition drew them to him.

The point of the Emmaus journey is that Jesus, although crucified, is alive and continues to show up and share life. How does the Emmaus encounter inspire your faith today? Where do you recognize the living Christ in your daily activities? Life transforming moments can happen anywhere at any time. I encourage every one of us to find a way to be Christ for another and then keep doing that as many times and in as many ways as possible. How will you share the love of the resurrected Christ?
