SCRIPTURES

Acts 2:1-21 (Adapted)

When the Feast of Pentecost came, they were all together in one place. Suddenly, a sound of rushing wind filled the building. Then like a wildfire, the Holy Spirit spread through their ranks and many spoke in different languages. There were many Jews in Jerusalem who came from faraway lands for the festival. When they heard the rushing wind, they came running. One by one they heard their mother tongue and were amazed when they heard foreigners speaking their own language. As they stood listening to all of the different babble, they joked among themselves that the disciples must have been drunk on cheap wine. Then Peter stood and spoke: "Fellow visiting Jews, listen carefully and hear this message: These people are not drunk. It is only 9 O'clock in the morning. There was no time for drinking. The prophet Joel announced this would happen. "In the last days, I will pour out my Spirit on every kind of people; your sons and your daughters will prophesy. Young men will see visions and old men will dream dreams. I'll set signs in the sky above, blood and fire and billowing smoke. The sun will turn black and the moon blood red, and whoever calls out to me, will be saved.

"When the Advocate comes, whom I will send to you from the Father, the Spirit of truth who comes from the Father, he will testify on my behalf. ²⁷You also are to testify because you have been with me from the beginning. ⁴But I have said these things to you so that when their hour comes you may remember that I told you about them. "I did not say these things to you from the beginning, because I was with you. ⁵But now I am going to him who sent me; yet none of you asks me, 'Where are you going?' ⁶But because I have said these things to you, sorrow has filled your hearts. ⁷Nevertheless I tell you the truth: it is to

your advantage that I go away, for if I do not go away, the Advocate will not come to you; but if I go, I will send him to you. ⁸And when he comes, he will prove the world wrong about sin and righteousness and judgment: ⁹about sin, because they do not believe in me; ¹⁰about righteousness, because I am going to the Father and you will see me no longer; ¹¹about judgment, because the ruler of this world has been condemned. ¹²"I still have many things to say to you, but you cannot bear them now. ¹³When the Spirit of truth comes, he will guide you into all the truth; for he will not speak on his own, but will speak whatever he hears, and he will declare to you the things that are to come. ¹⁴He will glorify me, because he will take what is mine and declare it to you. ¹⁵All that the Father has is mine. For this reason I said that he will take what is mine and declare it to you.


Refrain:

Sermon "Wait, Watch, Listen!"

Acts 2:1-21 John 15

Pentecost is a glorious day of celebration. The outpouring of the Holy Spirit, made evident by the tongues of flame and rushing wind, creates a community of believers empowered to share the Good News of Jesus with the world. News our world so desperately needs. Pentecost is the anniversary of when Jews from all over the world gathered in Jerusalem for a great party and they heard the disciples preaching in their own language, many came to believe that Jesus was God's chosen Messiah. Amid the festive hues, we celebrate the coming of the Spirit and the birthday of the church.

For me, Pentecost is all about unity, an all-inclusive movement shaking faith up and breaking walls down, inviting everything and everyone to be part of God's community. Fire, wind and Spirit dancing about, sprinkling a bit of God's grace everywhere. In this scene, diversity becomes a blessing, not a source of alienation. Instead of a common tongue, one language to rule them all, the Spirit gifts those present with understanding and knowledge that reaches beyond the barriers of human intelligence.

Whether we are witnessing this story with the fresh ears of the first century followers or hearing it again, dressed up in our best red, orange or yellow shirts, our text offers words of hope and inclusion. Jesus declared to his disciples that the Advocate would be with them in his absence. Peter, Christ's rock on which the church stands, spoke the words of the ancient prophet, Joel, to those gathered in Jerusalem:

"In the last days it will be, God declares, that I will pour out my Spirit upon all flesh, and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy, and the young shall see visions, and the old shall dream dreams. In those days I will pour out my Spirit; and they shall prophesy."

In other words, your sons and your daughters will have a word to speak, that life is stronger than death, hope is deeper than despair.

Through the power of Christ's resurrection; death will be no more. That resounding word is the gift the Holy Spirit gives us today. In a little while, we will hear a poem penned by Jan Richardson. The verses speak of waiting, watching and listening. In our hurried world, this may seem impossible, but our souls long for the gift of such lingering. The breath

of the Spirit continues to remind us of God's presence within and around us, generations after that first Jerusalem Pentecost.

Four years ago, Kara and I had covid together. She had been struggling to breathe for days, taking medicine, using her inhaler, and still the virus was not moving from her lungs. One night she woke from a dream and went right to an old canvas and started to cover it in black. She said she had to get it all out, the dream that woke her. She switched to oranges, reds, vibrant yellow and painted in bold fast strokes. While she created she told me about her dream, walking inside a huge glowing field where a drumming sound got louder and louder. She realized she was in her own body, the lung tissue turning more pink with each passing moment, the color deepening as the beating continued. As she worked with her brushes she breathed quietly for the first time in weeks. No coughing, no wheezing, no struggling to gather more oxygen. She wasn't fully over the virus, but she had certainly turned a corner toward healing. I am reminded of something my professor of Old Testament at LTS once said, "We will never be fully alive until we receive the breath

of God." Dr. O'Brien was on to something because such cannot summon such breath, cannot create it ourselves: but like a hope that surprises us, we will know when it hits us! The banner on the painting reads, "May every beat and breath be blessed!"

God's Spirit gives life to all things; it is not confined to human experience. God's Spirit also gives life to us. The Spirit moves within us, interceding between us, giving us wisdom to aim for what is best for us and the world. As we think about the message of Pentecost, we remember that at its core, the fiery winds remind us that God's Spirit provides presence for the challenging journeys ahead.

Peter told those young believers in the Holy City of Jerusalem that the Spirit helps them make sense of the present. In fact, Peter's entire Pentecost message offers an explanation of what God is making possible in our lives, even when all hope seems lost.

Jesus has sent us the Spirit to advocate for us in his absence. What does Jesus... the way he lived his life, his death, his resurrection... tell

us about God? Through our birthday celebration of the Church we acknowledge that the breath of God is at work, here and now. Through scripture and prayer and proclamation, experience and relationship, in service and mission: God's holy breath challenges us, comforts, clarifies, and even scares us at times.

Pentecost reassures us that God's Spirit is with us. Whether the original followers or the next generation of disciples, Christ's mission continues in this world. What part will you play? As people of Pentecost, God invites us to experience the fullness of life intended for everyone. To breathe deeply, take in the Spirit, and be changed. The Spirit does not always come to make us comfortable but to make us into a community, in all its searing difficulty and grace.

Fire, wind and Galileans speaking persuasively in many tongues were dramatic signs that God was doing a new thing that would transform the lives of all those present and far beyond, in time and place. Maybe it was a little uncomfortable and a bit frightening, something people would want to explain away, or to contain with cynical

comments blaming it all on drunkenness. But this much is true, many lives were changed on that first Pentecost. God IS still speaking, how will this community of faith allow God's Spirit to change our hearts in response to God's call? **Amen.**

This Grace That Scorches Us A Blessing for Pentecost Day

Here's one thing you must understand about this blessing: it is not for you alone. It is stubborn about this.

Do not even try to lay hold of it if you are by yourself, thinking you can carry it on your own.

To bear this blessing, you must first take yourself to a place where everyone does not look like you or think like you, a place where they do not believe precisely as you believe, where their thoughts and ideas and gestures are not exact echoes of your own.

Bring your sorrow.
Bring your grief.
Bring your fear.
Bring your weariness,
your pain, your disgust at how broken the world is,
how fractured, how fragmented by its fighting,
its wars, its hungers, its penchant for power,
its ceaseless repetition of the history it refuses to rise above.

I will not tell you this blessing will fix all that.

But in the place where you have gathered,
Wait; Watch; Listen.
Lay aside your inability to be surprised,
your resistance to what you do not understand.
See then whether this blessing turns to flame on your tongue,
sets you to speaking what you cannot fathom

or opens your ear to a language beyond your imagining that comes as a knowing in your bones, a clarity in your heart that tells you

this is the reason we were made: for this ache that finally opens us,

for this struggle, this grace that scorches us toward one another and into the blazing day.
